

ROOTS TO FRUITS is Christ Church Cathedral's holistic vision for children and youth spiritual formation and

community service. It is a comprehensive program of Christian education designed to track alongside the developmental stages (physical, cognitive, social-emotional) of children and youth from birth through high school.

Here's a brief outline adapted from the Learning Goals for Children found on the EDOT website:

PRESCHOOL – 1ST GRADE

to know God loves the child deeply. to talk with and respond to God. to know that we're God's children, created by God

to love. to experience church as a lively, secure place where people care and listen to them.

2ND - 5TH GRADE

to begin to understand and relate to God the Father, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit.

to feel comfortable with spontaneous prayer and to have experienced various kinds of prayer (intercession, thanksgiving, and praise).

to understand God creates and loves our world and we in turn are responsible for caring for it.

JUNIOR HIGH

to begin to expand a role in the church family: serving as an acolyte, volunteering at Youth Service days.

to memorize and understand key phrases from worship services and biblical passages: the Nicene Creed, the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the Confession, certain prayers.

SENIOR HIGH

to begin building a more mature self-image, more stable relationships (outside of the family), and a more coherent understanding of the world.

to continue involvement in ministry and outreach.

to begin to identify one's gifts and interests.

to be able to explain the biblical story of God's people and the life of Jesus.

to know teachers' and classmates' names. to explore Old Testament stories and many New Testament stories, especially stories of Jesus. to learn key phrases from the church's liturgy: And also with you. Thanks be to God.

to know the Bible stories that recount Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost events.

to understand Jesus' acts, as recounted in the Bible, that lead to our celebrations of **Baptism and Eucharist** and recognize the actions of both sacraments as experienced in worship.

be able to read and discuss short biblical passages. to explore the plot and characters in Jesus'

to become familiar with stories of Jesus' care for the sick, the poor, and the

to gain an understanding of Church seasons, colors, and symbols, creating symbols with personal meaning.
